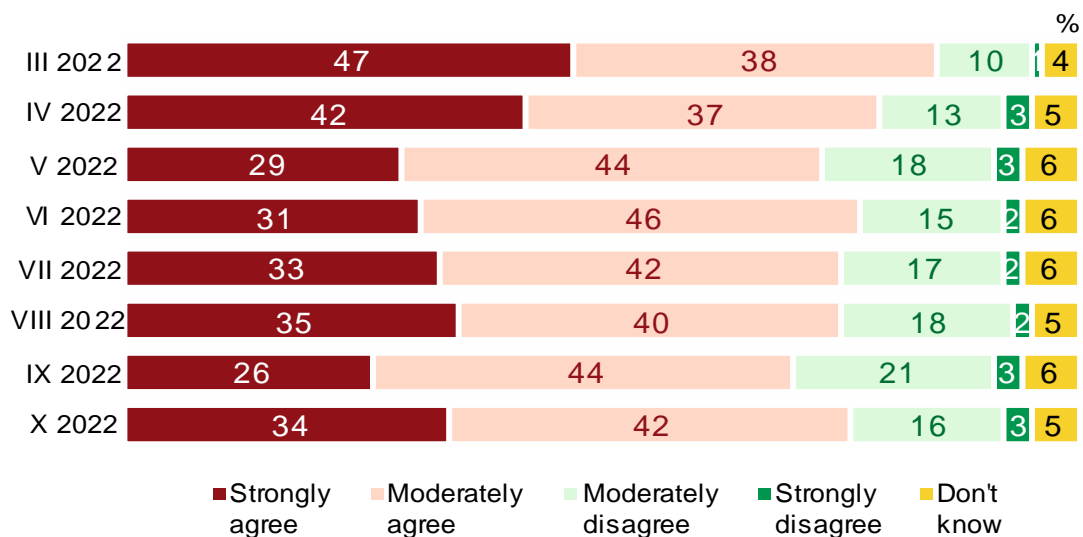


## Opinions about the war in Ukraine

The percentage of Poles who feel that the war in Ukraine is a threat to our country's security has increased by 6 percentage points in relation to the record-low result in September 2022, i.e. from 70% to 76%. This is not an out-of-line result: since April 2022 this number has remained in the range from 70% to 79% and was higher only right after the outbreak of the war, when it reached 85%.

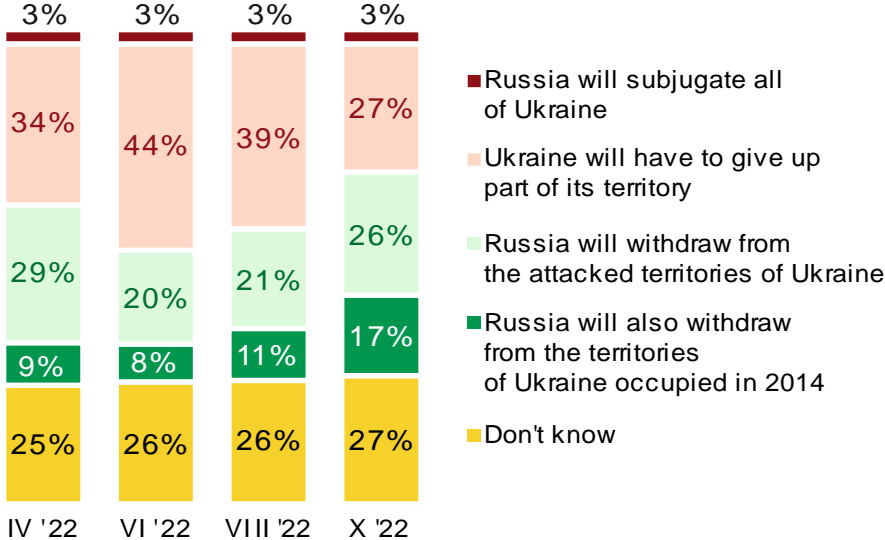
### Do you agree that the war in Ukraine a threat to the security of Poland?



Poles' predictions about the end of the conflict have never been so optimistic. The percentage of respondents who predict that Ukraine will have to give up part of its territory to Russia has decreased by 12 percentage points since the last measurement in August (a drop from 39% to 27%). At the same time, one-fourth (26%) think that Russia will have to

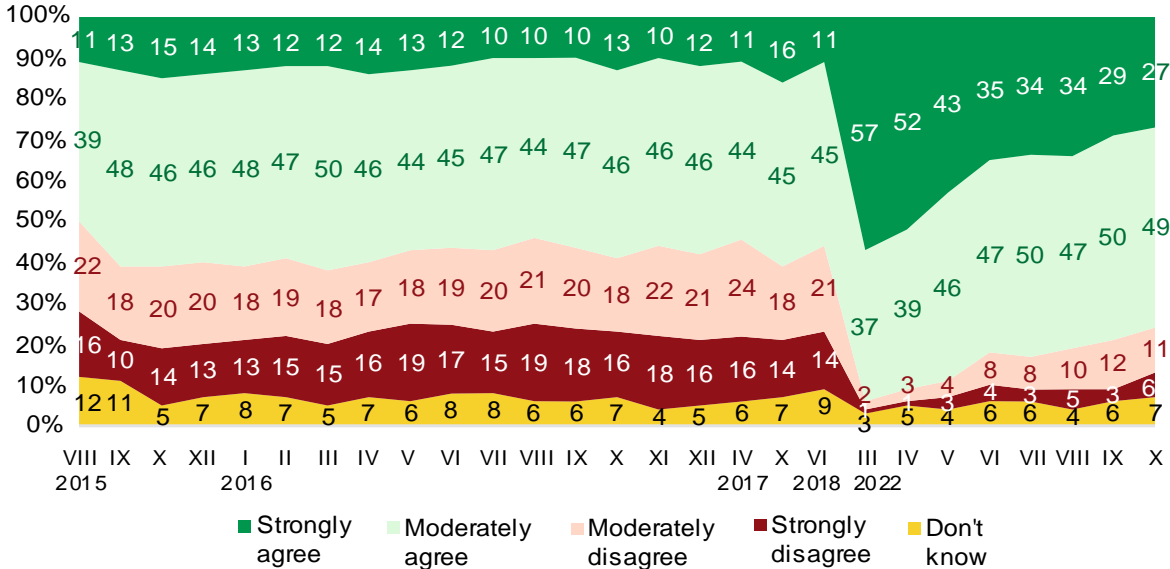
withdraw from the territories attacked since February, and one-sixth (17%) believe that it will even withdraw from Crimea. This means that a total of 43% of Poles expect a favourable scenario for Ukraine, which makes it the prevailing opinion.

**How do you think the war will end?**



Three-quarters of Poles (76% compared to 79% a month ago) support the acceptance of Ukrainian refugees in our country, and this result is in line with the mild but clear downward trend that we have observed since the beginning of the war, not counting a slight bump in July.

**Do you agree that Poland should accept Ukrainian refugees from the areas affected by the conflict?**



Half of Poles (50%) declare that someone in their households voluntarily and free of charge help Ukrainian refugees. Although this percentage has remained at a very similar level since May, it should be noted that this month we are dealing with a slightly more pronounced, 3-point decline from 53% in September to 50% now.
